## **OVERVIEW**

The Kelowna Museums Society (KMS) operates the Okanagan Heritage Museum, Okanagan Military Museum, Okanagan Wine and Orchard Museum, Laurel Packinghouse, and Central Okanagan Sports Hall of Fame. In addition, the KMS operates the Kelowna Public Archives, Vince Bezeau Military Library and Archives, Ursula Surtees Regional Conservation Lab, and Laurel Packinghouse event rentals.

The Kelowna Museums Society operates on the unceded traditional territory of the syilx/Okanagan people.

# **EXHIBITIONS**

The Okanagan Heritage Museum featured several diverse feature exhibitions throughout the year. First, we hosted *BC's Marvellous Mushrooms*, a travelling exhibit created by the Royal BC Museum. Visitors were keen to learn more about the mushrooms growing in the region, and came in to study up on what they could find close to home. Throughout the summer months, the colourful *Jenga Jenga* was on display. Guest curator Hanna Karin showcased recycled materials and art from Canada and Myanmar. *Chief Dan George: Actor and Activist* was installed in September, and opened to a full house on the National Day of Truth and Reconciliation. Produced by the North Vancouver Museum and Archives, this exhibition drew a wonderful public response throughout its run, and many were moved to share their memories of the late Chief with us.

2022 also saw our own travelling exhibitions loaned out and on view around the province. *Bats: Out of the Darkness* was set up for three months in Victoria, at the Royal BC Museum's Pocket Gallery. It also travelled to Vernon's Alan Brooks Nature Centre, where they were thrilled to host a record number of fall school trips based on the exhibit's content! *Waterways - the Past, Present and Future* made its debut as a travelling exhibition, and was displayed in Salmon Arm as well as Osoyoos.

## **COLLECTIONS & CONSERVATION**

In 2022, the collections department undertook much meaningful work. Interns, summer students, volunteers, and the Curator of Collections catalogued over 6,000 objects in the Past Perfect database! A new acquisition of histology objects from a local doctor added fascinating pieces to the medical collection, while the model train collection was organized with custom enclosures to protect them while in storage. Most noteworthy, database records were completed for the entire First Nations collection, and this accomplishment in turn allowed KMS to start sharing inventories with representatives from local Indigenous communities – an integral step in the repatriation process.

Sadly, 2022 also marked the passing of former Executive Director, Ursula Surtees, who was instrumental in establishing the Ursula Surtees Regional Conservation Lab. This past year, the lab was a hub of activity, with conservation staff performing treatments on public heirlooms and museum artifacts, including horse saddles, a Black Mountain irrigation map from the 1920s and the Bennett cartoon collection.

In December, after 8 years of service, Curator of Collections, Nikki Bose, moved on to a new career. The museum wishes her success in her future endeavors.

The important work done this past year demonstrates the dedication and hard work of staff and volunteers in preserving and sharing the area's rich history.

# ARCHIVES

The Kelowna Public Archives and the Vince Bezeau Military Library and Archives hold our community memory in the form of documents, photographs, maps, sound recordings, and moving images. These unique materials have been organized, preserved and made available to students, genealogists, authors and researchers.

2022 saw researchers return in-person, however virtual appointments have remained popular, allowing researchers from across the country to access to our collections with the added bonus of spending in-depth, one-on-one time with our archivist.

Utilizing equipment the Archives acquired in 2021, we digitized over 14,000 textual records and 30 audio recordings in 2022. We prioritized the creation of digital preservation copies of fragile artifacts and obsolete media. We also focused on digitizing and applying Optical Character Recognition (OCR) to frequently used materials including reference books, early Kelowna brochures, and telephone directories to increase in-house search capacities.

With the assistance of our Archives Intern, we completed two projects that included de-framing, rehousing and inventorying 520+ photographs, documents and posters. 12 oversized boxes of archival materials were also rehoused into 42 neatly arranged and inventoried archival grade Hollinger boxes. Projects such as these aid in the creation of much needed storage space, make the materials more accessible, and help to safely preserve archival materials.

## **OKANAGAN MILITARY MUSEUM**

In the spring, a new feature exhibit was installed in the front gallery. Building on a past OHM success, curatorial staff created an interactive exhibition-turned-trivia-game called *ArtiFACT or ArtiFICTION: OMM edition* for visitors to challenge themselves – or each other – with as they explored the space. Planning began this year as well for a future overhaul of the permanent galleries.

The *Mannequin Madness* escape room continued to be popular with families and small groups as they raced against the clock to save the world! Other public offerings included the four part *Guided Tour of Duty* series, in which our in-house expert Keith Boehmer offered fascinating hands-on gallery tours. During the Remembrance season, programming staff hosted nearly 300 students who visited the Field of Crosses in City Park and the museum. The annual Remembrance Day Open House saw 145 visitors come through the door to pay their respects.


The OMM's online presence continued to grow throughout the year with a regularly published blog on the OMMS website, as well as increased other social media content.

## CENTRAL OKANAGAN SPORTS HALL OF FAME ...to honour and inspire...

2022 saw the Central Okanagan Sports Hall of Fame make a much anticipated return to in-person events. The induction ceremony was abuzz with excitement and the committees were proud to officially recognize the newest class of inspiring inductees.

The Central Okanagan Sports Hall of Fame was proud to honour the following:

#### Jack May • Builder

Jack committed a lifetime to basketball. A coach, referee, and administrator, he also was the founder of the Western Canada Basketball tournament.

## Phil Ellis • Athlete

Phil dominated the local running scene for years, won 14 medals as a member of the national team and holds the third fastest 10km time for a Canadian at Vancouver's Harry Jerome International meet.

### **Rob Friend** • Athlete

Rob represented Canada on the soccer field before he was 20 years old, and spent 11 years playing professionally in Europe. He is now organizing a Canadian Premiere League team for the lower mainland.

Credited by Softball BC as being a key part of the game's history in the province, KMMF began in 1940 and have hosted events from selection camps to provincial and even international tournaments.

## **EDUCATION & PUBLIC PROGRAMMING**

In response to demand from a screen-weary public, most of our guided experiences in 2022 were delivered in-person. We hosted nearly 7,500 participants in our spaces, both virtual and actual.

A major focus was the emerging role of KMS in co-curricularmaking and Indigenous partnerships. An example is our continued work with UBCO on the research project *Co-Curricular-Making*— *Honoring Indigenous Connections to Land, Culture, and the Relational Self*. This project informed a partnership with the Kelowna Art Gallery to offer learning experiences inspired by the *Witness Blanket*, which reflected the tragedies of the Indian Residential School experience. In addition, we moved more deeply into partnership with Wild Rose Native Traditions to offer Elder-led education on syilx/Okanagan language, culture, knowledge and perspective.

The National Day of Truth and Reconciliation coincided with the public opening of the *Chief Dan George* exhibition. We were pleased to host over 800 visitors, and were honoured to welcome Grand Chief Stuart Phillip and Joan Phillip – granddaughter of Chief Dan George – who took the time to make a surprise appearance to chat with visitors and answer questions.

Other new and continued offerings included *Mannequin Madness* (an exit-room styled adventure at OMM), the *Guided Tour of Duty* series, *Los tours del Museo* and the *History of BC Wine in Nine Bottles*. Guided cemetery tours with the inimitable Bob Hayes continued to be popular, as well as downtown walking tours.

We were sad to say goodbye to Jen Garner, who spent many years growing KMS programming, however, we were pleased to welcome Solange Massicotte as our new Head of Programming as well as talented new Education Assistants.

2022 was a year of transition. The Okanagan Wine and Orchard Museum re-opened following two years of COVID closure and gallery renewal. Programming staff prepared new wine and orchard programs, and hosted Indigenous-led public programs in the rental hall and Laurel Square throughout the year.

Public rentals resumed, but did not meet levels of previous years due to COVID uncertainty. Shelley Weber did an incredible job of maintaining positive relations as she guided renters through a challenging period. These efforts were recognized, as – despite the challenges of pandemic restrictions – the Laurel was again named Kelowna's Best Wedding Venue.


